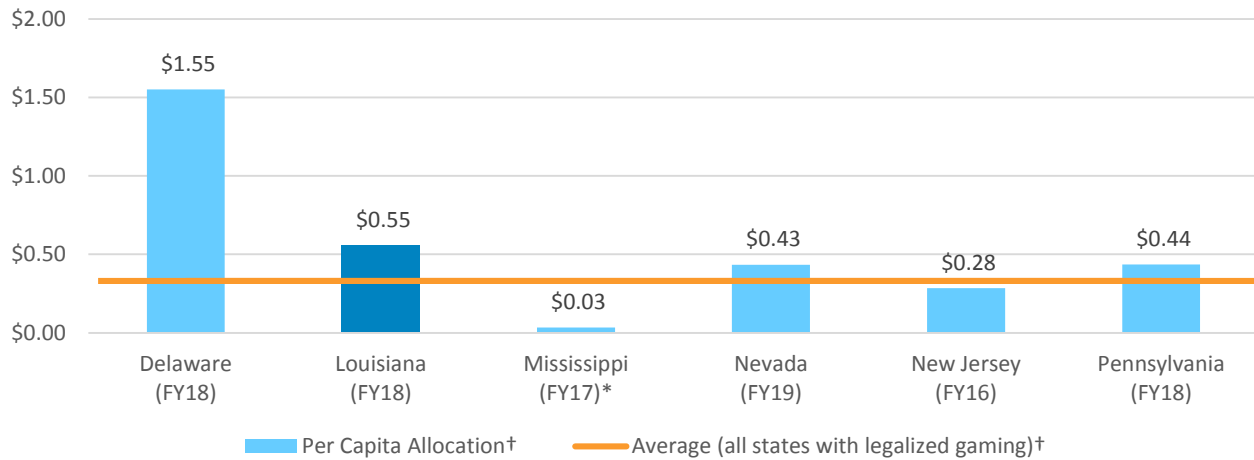




Funding for Compulsive and Problem Gambling Prevention and Treatment

Louisiana per capita spending on compulsive and problem gambling is above the median

State	Statutory Requirements for Allocations
Delaware	\$1,000,000 or 1% from video lottery revenue appropriated to Department of Health and Social Services for compulsive gambling \$250,000 or 1% from gross table game revenue appropriated to the Department of Health and Social Services for compulsive gambling 1% of proceeds from charitable video lottery appropriated to the Department of Health and Social Services for compulsive gambling
Mississippi	No statutory requirement; Mississippi Gaming Commission previously granted \$100,000
Nevada	\$2 per slot machine subject to license fee appropriated to the Revolving Account to Support Programs for the Prevention and Treatment of Problem Gambling
New Jersey	\$600,000 from penalties appropriated to the Department of Human Services (\$500,000 to the Council on Compulsive Gambling of New Jersey, \$100,000 to provide funds for compulsive gambling treatment programs in the state) \$200,000 from Racing Commission permit holder assessment appropriated to the Department of Human Services for compulsive gambling up to \$50,000 of forfeited winnings, appropriated to the Department of Human Services for compulsive gambling \$250,000 for each internet gaming permit appropriated to the Department of Human Services (\$140,000 to Council on Compulsive Gambling, \$110,000 for compulsive gambling treatment programs) \$100,000 for each sports wagering license appropriated to the Department of Health for compulsive gambling
Pennsylvania	2% of interactive gaming revenue appropriated to the Compulsive and Problem Gambling Treatment Fund 2% of sports wagering revenue and all forfeited funds from sports wagering appropriated to the Compulsive and Problem Gambling Treatment Fund \$2,000,000 or 2% of slots revenue appropriated to the Compulsive and Problem Gambling Treatment Fund
Louisiana	\$500,000 each from lottery, video draw poker, riverboat gaming, land-based casino, and racetrack slot machine revenues appropriated to the Compulsive and Problem Gaming Fund
